2. Analyze Part - III, IV and Part - IV-A of the Indian Constitution from the perspective of Political Obligation of the Government of India and the Citizens of India.
3. "All men recognize the right to revolution; that is, to refuse to allegiance to, and to resist the government, when its tyranny or its inefficiency is great and unendurable. When a sixth of the population of a nation which has undertaken to be the refuge of liberty are slaves, and a whole country is unjustly overrun and conquered by a foreign army, and subjected to military law, I think that is not too soon for honest men to rebel and revolutionize." - Whose words are these? Test Whether there is a significant difference between sales made by the four salesmen during different months. [Given that the significant value of F at 5 % level of significance for (3,6) degree of freedom is 4.75 (Table value) and for (2,6) degree of freedom is 5.14 (Table Value)]

2. Calculate the two regression equation of X on Y and Y on X from the data given below, taking deviations from actual means of X and Y

Estimate the likely demand when the price is Rs.20.

3. The following figures relate to the number of units of an item produced per shift by two workers A and B for a number of days. Answer using the F-test at 5 per cent level of significance.

A : 19 22 24 27 24 18 20 19 25
B : 26 37 40 35 30 30 40 26 30 35 45

Can it be inferred that worker A is more stable compared to worker B? [Given that the significant value of F at 5 % level of significance for (8, 10) degree of freedom is 3.35 (Table value)]

 2. Mr. A is a Manufacturer of Air conditioners. He is following a skimming price strategy to price his product. As his competitor companies offer the product under a penetration pricing model, he wanted to follow the Economy pricing model. As a marketing researcher what would be your advice on this decision?
 3. How can you identify the brand preference of Cosmetic Consumers in India? Please draw a questionnaire for the research.
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FAMILY LAW – I

PART – A (3 X 10 = 30 Marks)

Answer the following questions with relevant legal provision and judicial pronouncements:

1. Mr. X and Mrs. Y were married and eventually divorced by mutual consent under the Christian Law. They have a child Q (aged 4 years) living with the mother with the permission of the court after the divorce. Mrs. Y is not educated nor employed. She does not have income to sustain her and to maintain her child Q.
 - a. Can Mrs. Y claim maintenance under Criminal Procedure Code after being married/divorced under their personal law? Can there be a maintenance claim separately for the child Q? Critically comment. (Consider the situation that Mr. X is financially stronger to maintain both wife and the child)
 - b. If Mrs. Y and Mr. Z are in live-in relationship after Mrs. Y getting her divorce from Mr. X, can she still claim maintenance under CrPC? What happens to the maintenance claim when Mrs. Y marries Mr. Z? Critically comment. Consider the child Q is still with the mother Mrs. Y.
2. Mr. A and Mrs. B have two daughters, M (aged 3 years) and N (11 years). After the divorce, the custody of the daughters was given to the father by court order under Hindu law. After a year, the mother claims custody over child M and a visitation right/access for the child N. During the court procedures, child N showed abnormal behaviour of anxiety and stress and refused to even talk with the mother. When compelled to have a short conversation as a process of mediation, child N stressed out, cried and refused to even take food on the following days. *Under the given, decide on the case of visitation right for Child N and eventually decide on the case of custody for child M when claimed by the mother.*

3. Mr. P is an unmarried Hindu (aged 19 years). He decides to adopt a child.

- a. Advise him on the legality of the law of adoption that is applicable to Mr.P
- b. Eventually when Mr. P decides to marry, would that adoption be an obstacle?
- c. Critically comment on **your opinion** on the need for a Uniform Law of Adoption in India.

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LAW OF CONTRACTS –I

PART – A (3 X 10 = 30 Marks)**Answer the following questions:**

1. Vir Singh, (“Mortgagor”/ “Promisor”) was a hardworking farmer. Kripal Singh was a money lender in the village of Vir Singh. Kripal Singh passed away suddenly remaining his two sons Hazara Singh and Dharmendra Singh.

On 23rdFebruary,2018 Vir Singh mortgaged 2 acres of his land to Hazara Singh and Dharmendra Singh (“Mortgagees” /“Promisees”) for Rs. 10,00,000/-. On 20th September 2019, Dharmendra Singh, one of the Joint Promisees received Rs.5,00,000/- i.e., his share of the mortgage money and released one-half share of the mortgaged property.

On 31stMarch, 2020Vir Singh, the promisor died leaving five sons. After the death of Vir Singh, Kharak Singh, one of the five sons, met their family lawyer. The lawyer told him that Vir Singh registered a Will distributing his assets equally for his five sons. But there are certain liabilities also for the testator.

Hazara Singh and Dharmendra Singh, the promisees sent a legal notice to Ganvir Singh, brother of Kharak Singh, claiming balance mortgage money of Rs. 5,00,000/-. Ganvir Singh sent a reply notice stating that he is not liable to settle Rs. 5,00,000/- being one of the five coheirs of the deceased.

Decide the case analysing contentions of Hazara Singh, Dharmendra Singh and Ganvir Singh?

2. M/s. Jainsons, a firm dealing in readymade garments advertises in newspaper about Clearance Sale of their stocks. C, a customer visits the shop, picks up a shirt lying in the lot with price tag of Rs. 400/- takes to salesman, asks him to pack the shirt and prepare the bill.

Salesman discovers that shirt in question should have been in the collection of articles with price tag of Rs. 500/- and refuses to sell the shirt to C and tells him it was wrongly put in the collection of articles with price tag of Rs. 400/-.

Can C compel the M/s Jainsons to sell the particular shirt to C at Rs. 400/-?

3. A agreed to deliver to B on 01/01/2021 fifty bags of cement for Rs.100/- per bag. He tendered the bag on 01/01/2021 but B refused to accept delivery as the price of cement bag had fallen to Rs. 80/- per bag. Subsequently the market rose and on 01/06/2021, A sold the cement bag at Rs. 180/- per bag.

A sued B for damages of Rs. 4,000/- which is equivalent to the profit of selling the fifty bags of cement on 01/06/2021. Advice B to defend the suit instituted by A.
